Concept Outline

Africa is the world's fastest urbanizing region, manifesting itself in the growth of its megacities as well as its smaller towns and cities. The continent is expected to experience a total population increase of about 60% between 2010 and 2050, with the urban population tripling to 1.23 billion during this period. Around 2030, Africa's collective population will become 50% urban.

Due to climate change, disasters affecting Africa -such as cyclones, floods, droughts and disease outbreaks - are increasing in frequency, unpredictability, severity and impact. As it has been very clearly illustrated by the ongoing C19 crisis, urban areas are generally more vulnerable to risks than rural areas due to denser populations, concentration of assets, and variety of activities within comparatively smaller geographic areas. These events impact a range of sectors from water supply to food and health systems, and disproportionately affect marginalized and vulnerable populations. While cities face the biggest disaster risk, cities are also where the solutions are...because cities are where people are.

This project will assist four countries to build their urban resilience including a mix of city-level infrastructure projects and national-level capacity-building. Four cities with different types of vulnerabilities were selected in these countries to implement climate adaptation projects following a participatory resilience planning process. The pilot projects include 4-8 interventions in each city, for example rehabilitating mangroves in Morondava (Madagascar), constructing and rehabilitating bridges and dams on Likangala River in Zomba (Malawi), constructing safe havens in Chokwe (Mozambique) and improving solid waste management in informal neighborhoods of Moroni (Comoros).

Leveraging the practical implementation of the project at the city level, best practices and guidelines will be derived to create the conditions for replication in other cities and towns at the national level. This national-level component will include elements of training and capacity-building for both central and local authorities to start laying the foundations for building urban climate resilience.

Given that most of the extreme climate events affecting south-eastern Africa are transboundary, there is a need to enhance inter-country collaboration to mitigate the impact of natural hazards. This project promotes inter-country experience sharing and cross-fertilization and establishes a knowledge platform on urban resilience related issues that can be disseminated in the sub-region, through the Disaster Risk Management, Sustainability and Urban Resilience Centre (DiMSUR).

The Project Inception Workshop provides the opportunity to bring all project stakeholders together, to review the project work plan and partnerships. In attendance will be representatives of the four national governments, local government officials from the participating four cities, representatives of the executing and partner organizations as well as UN system and development partners.

Objectives for the Launch event:

- Officially launch UN-Habitat's first multi-country Adaptation Fund project "Building Urban Climate Resilience in South-Eastern Africa"
- Discuss the multifaceted challenges and opportunities for resilience building using the examples of Madagascar, Malawi, Mozambique and the Union of Comoros
- Build a community of practice to support the successful implementation and replication of the project

Objectives for the Steering Committee/ DiMSUR Executive Committee/ Inception Workshop:

- Bring together the key partners and stakeholders from the city-, national- and regional-levels involved in this project.
- Exchange information on plans for the project in each city and country and establish a mechanism for sharing information and best practices at the regional level.
- Prepare a joint workplan and implementation strategy for year one, taking into consideration ongoing complementary initiatives, relevant policies/ strategies and stakeholder engagement (to be approved by the Steering Committee).
- Discuss and agree on strategies related to knowledge management, communications and outreach, as well as environmental and social safeguards, gender and youth.
